


SUNRISE/I-95 BEAUTIFICATION

Representatives from the Broward Beautiful Board, Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), the City of Fort Lauderdale, the Broward County Board of County Commissioners, Broward County Department of Planning and Environmental Protection (DPEP) and the MPO came together November 13th to formulate a plan to re-landscape the interchange around I-95 at Sunrise Boulevard. This project conceived under Broward Beautiful's new "Highway Beautification Grants Program" would be the first of a number of I-95 interchange landscaping projects to enhance "gateways to Broward County." The Sunrise project will be the model for future projects incorporating six key concepts:

- A strong positive impact on the aesthetics of the "Gateway"
- Provide shade tree canopy
- Provide wildlife habitat
- Use native plant species
- Use a diversity of plant species
- Incorporate Xerescaping (using plants with low water needs) concepts.

It was agreed that while long term funding for the ongoing projects would be sought through various sources; the partner agencies identified nearly \$300,000 in discretionary funds which would be used to begin the first phases of the Sunrise interchange immediately. A collaborative design team from the partner organizations was tasked to draft a conceptual plan and cost estimate for review by January 2003.





WHAT A REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION **AUTHORITY WOULD MEAN FOR BROWARD COUNTY:**

One of the most critical issues facing residents of Broward, Miami-Dade and Palm Beach Counties is the need for an efficient, reliable, affordable regional public transit system. The lack of meaningful mass transit alternatives impacts every facet of our lives: where we work, where we live, where we play, our economic stability and even our physical and mental well-being.

Although we are continually working to keep up and improve mass transit in Broward County, each year we are confronted with funding shortfalls. The current Long Range Transportation Plan has an estimated \$400 million in unfunded transit needs, which could go up to \$1.06 billion, if the county does not receive its expected \$660 million in discretionary Federal Transit Agency New Start funding.

With these kinds of financial deficiencies the tri-counties can no longer work in isolation, but must explore new ways to not only build a seamless, easy-to-use transit system throughout the South Florida region, but also take advantage of special funding opportunities available when legislative power is pooled so that federal and state funding can be sought on a unified regional basis.

By creating a Regional Transportation Authority special funding opportunities can be pursued. For instance, if approved by the state legislature, the authority would be able to collect up to \$2 on license plate fees in the tri-county area. Leveraged with state and federal aid, the authority would have \$65 million to \$70 million annually for regional transit projects-these dollars would not otherwise come into the region.

This new funding would allow us to continue our regional transit projects such as the "transit bridge". The Broward County Transit "Bridge" study area is bounded by University Drive on the west, I-595 on the north, I-95 on the east, and the Biscayne Canal on the south (including the Golden Glades Interchange) When complete this system will connect two key transit services in Miami-Dade County (i.e., the Golden Glades Intermodal Terminal and the North Corridor; NW 27th Avenue high-performance transit extension) with connections to the I-595 high-performance transit corridor in central Broward County.

A Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) could coordinate transit marketing efforts and integrate procurement processes. This will enhance the efficiency and coordination of all transit service in the region and establish a unified entity to meet South Florida's transportation planning and funding needs.

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING Changing Directors



Bruce Wilson, who has served as Transportation Planning Director for Broward County since1980, will retire January 4, 2003.

'The most important aspect of our work, and the point that I am most proud of, is the

working relationships we have developed with other local agencies and the community-at-large." Wilson said. "I'm also very proud of the Transportation Planning staff members who have built a solid reputation as being able to do sound technical work that now serves as a model for other MPO's in the state and our active involvement with the Technica Coordinating Committee and Community Involvement Roundtable allows us to hear the community's opinion in the planning process and make sure we are building systems that work for the people who are using them."

For the purpose of succession planning, Ms. Jennifer Schaufele has worked with Mr. Wilson in directing the division since February 1999. To better understand the regulatory and funding requirements and processes applicable to transportation planning, Schaufele has assumed responsibility for administering several related activities including supervision of a professional planning and engineering staff of thirty. Schaufele, whose degree is in Professional Business Management, has worked for Broward County for fourteen years, the last six serving as Assistant to the Department Director of Planning and Environmental Protection. "I'm extremely pleased with the way the transition has been going," Wilson said. "Our clients can expect a very smooth changeover."

"I look forward to making a positive impact on the community and helping the Commission and the MPO implement their vision for transit, safety, and economic vitality in Broward County" Schaufele said


HOLLYWOOD/PINES Corridor Study

The Broward County Congestion Management Team has been preparing to go forward with the Hollywood/Pines Boulevard Corridor study.

This study seeks to identify the mix of transportation improvements that would be most effective in moving people and goods effectively through this corridor while balancing enhancements with available funding and community concerns.

This study will also examine the feasibility of Intermodal connections with the Tri-Rail Stations, Bus Transfer Stations, Airports, Port, and other transportation facilities.

The study area boundaries are: US 1 to the east, SW 172 Avenue to the west, Sheridan Street to the north, and Hallandale Beach Boulevard to the south.



Q: What is Intermodal?

Passengers with disabilities who can not purchase a ticket through the automated ticket machines, can request a self addressed stamped envelope from onboard security personnel, in order to mail payment after their trip (transfers purchased by Tri-Rail riders can be included in the payment envelope and the cost of the transfer can be deducted from the Tri-Rail fare).

A: Denotes the seamless movement of people or goods between transport modes.

Q: What are transport modes?

A: Any one of the following means of moving people or goods: aviation, bicycle, highway, paratransit, pedestrian, pipeline, rail, transit and water.

WHAT IS THE MPO?

Established in 1977 by the Florida Legislature, the MPO was created to direct urban transportation planning and allocate federal and state funds. It is the lead agency responsible for developing and administrating plans and programs to maintain eligibility and receive funds for the transportation systems in Broward County.

Made up of government representatives who plan and recommend transportation project priorities, the MPO consists of nineteen members including representatives from local cities, Tri-Rail. the School Board of Broward County, and the Board of Broward County Commissioners.

DON'T GET STUCK IN TRAFFIC - Call 511!

Wouldn't it be great to receive up to the minute travel information before you leave home or work on a daily basis? Well, 511 is here and available to residents in the Miami-Dade, Broward and West Palm Beach areas for free. 511 provides real-time traffic, road condition and traffic updates, it also tells the status of an incident and lets you know when roads are clear or what alternate routes you can take.



The official debut of 511 was in July of 2002; the system is updated every ten minutes or less and is active 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The 511 service covers 2,000 miles of road including all highways, state roads, side streets, major festivals/events and airports in the tri-county area; 511 also reports on the weather and how it might affect travel conditions. You can access the service by e-mail, web page, fax or telephone, the service is available in English and Spanish. You can also hear real-time traffic updates on 91.3 WLRN.

Road condition information is reported from a variety of sources such as; Florida Highway Patrol (FHP), Department of Transportation (DOT), public information officers, road rangers, traffic cameras and travelers on the

roadway. All information is confirmed before it is released to the public.

511 has been made possible by a public-private partnership which was formed to bring this service to the tri-county area. Fifteen agengies and organizations including the three tri-county MPO's, FHP, DOT, and Florida Turnpike are participating.

Since its debut the 511 call service has received a 96% approval rating and gets 67,000 calls per month. In 2003 the public will be able to access transit and traffic info by dialing 511.
